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Subhash Chandra Bose Aapda Prabandhan Puraskar 2022

Gujarat Institute of Disaster Management (GIDM), established in 2012, received the **S.C. Bose Aapda Prabandhan Puraskar for 2022** under institutional category while Professor Vinod Sharma, a senior professor at the Indian Institute of Public Administration and Vice-Chairman of the Sikkim State DMA, founder-co-ordinator of the National Centre of Disaster Management, now known as the National Institute of Disaster Management has been awarded the **S.C. Bose Aapda Prabandhan Puraskar for 2022** under Individual category.

This year's awardees were conferred with the Award, alongwith the awardees of the year 2019, 2020 and 2021, by Prime Minister, Shri Narendra Modi at the investiture ceremony held on 23rd January 2022 to commemorate the 125th birth anniversary of Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose.


Awardee for 2019 was **8 Bn NDRF, Ghaziabad**

Sphere India HR, Finance and Membership committee met on 16th December and Executive Committee met on 17th Dec 2021 as a regular process meetings. Apart from taking stock of the action points, Organisation compliances, HR, Finance and Program Updates, the Executive Committee reviewed preparations for the AGM and approved Sphere India Strategic Plan 2025.

The Annual General Meeting was organised on 22nd Dec 2021. The meeting appointed Statutory Auditor for year 2022-23, approved Budget for 2022-23; revisions in organisational policies, Strategy 2025; Annual Program Report with Audited Accounts 2020-21 and new members as recommended by Executive Committee for approvals.





Programs Update

Inter-Agency Coordination

Emergency Coordination

In the last 3 months of 2021 (October to December), Sphere India along with its partners carried out Joint Needs Assessment for Kerala Flash Floods in October 2021, Tamil Nadu Floods 2021, Uttarakhand Floods in October 2021, Andhra Pradesh Floods in November 2021 and Dimapur Fire in December 2021. Additionally, Kerala IAG has concluded the JDNA in 4 flood affected districts jointly with KSDMA, Unicef and Sphere India.

COVID 19 Response: Due to an exponential rise in the number of COVID-19 cases, which was higher than the peak of pandemic's second wave, SI IAC Committee has called an emergency meeting to assess the situation and plan joint actions. NDMA has also called meeting with civil-society organizations and encouraged that Government and CSOs need to work together. Both forums have emphasised more on the strengthening local coordination, promotion of CAB, vaccination promotion through engagement of mass influencers, encouragement of home isolation as per guidelines, engagement of CSOs in facilitating isolation for vulnerable and supporting system. And there is need to prepared well for crisis as far major indicators on hospital beds, oxygen, and other essentials may be concerned where CSOs can pick up early info of stresses in local context and work in collaboration with Government. In this sequence, State IAGs/ Networks have immediately taken actions and organized session on "Omicon, Delta, Paediatric Cases, and Adolescent Vaccination Strategies" cum GO-NGO meeting in Maharashtra, Rajasthan, Madhya Pradesh and Bihar, similar meetings are planned in other states in first week of February.

In response to COVID-19 and other Emergencies IAC program is engaged in continuous coordination with State IAGs/ Networks, Sphere India members, other partners and stakeholders. 6 Alerts were disseminated for cold wave, 5 Situation reports on COVID-19 were also along with initiation of URS.



Capacity Building of IAGs

For strengthening more localised coordination with in-depth knowledge about vulnerability and resilience, models and tools, standards in relief measures, maximizing community engagement and transforming information into a professional plan aligned with unified efforts, 3 days training organized for District Focal Point Persons/ IAG Members in Uttarakhand and Nagaland covering the Basics of Emergency Management, Emergency Coordination for Assessments, SOPs, Emergency Management Tools and Humanitarian Logistics and Supply Chain Management, Coordination related Documentation etc. Similar training are scheduled in Kerala and J&K in February.

Uttarakhand Nagaland

The needs of the members were identified through joint coordination of Sphere India and UK IAG and session plans were chartered to cater the needs of existing members. 3 day trainings were organised on JRNA, Kobo Toolbox, Core Humanitarian Standards and Flood Preparedness & Response.

On 8th January 2022, third session was concluded on "Humanitarian Logistics and Supply Chain Management". Details, need and objectives of Humanitarian Logistics, Procurement, Transportation and Distribution process were some of the key topics explained by Mr. Gopal Thapliyal, Project Manager, Plan India, Uttarakhand, while Mr. Dhiraj Kumar, Country Programme Administrator, Handicap International, took a session on process, system & risk assessment of Supply Chain Management.

The needs of the Nagaland IAG members were identified through coordinated efforts of Sphere India and session plans were chartered. The training session consisted of a 2 day program on Essential Humanitarian Practice and Minimum Humanitarian Standards in Emergencies.

Training session on "Essential Humanitarian Practices" was conducted on 8th January, 2022 by Sphere India team. The Second training was conducted on 7th January, 2022 on "Minimum Humanitarian Standards in Emergencies", moderated by Mr. Tapan Patel, Founder, Centre For Integrated Development. These sessions surmised on the Sphere Humanitarian Charter on the core legal principles that have most bearing on the welfare of those affected by disaster or conflict.

COVID 19 Academy (National and State Level)

Session to commemorate National Youth Day-The Indian government proclaimed the 12th of January as National Youth Day in 1984 on the occasion of Swami Vivekananda's birthday. The theme for National Youth Day 2022 was "It's All in the Mind" focusing on which a panel discussion was organised to reawaken the inexhaustible vitality of youngsters, understand and provide them a better platform to put across their thoughts freely.

Session to commemorate National Girl Child Day and International Day of Education-The Covid-19 Academy Team had organized a panel discussion to highlight the vulnerabilities and strengths of the girl children along with the child's right to education and its challenges during the pandemic. The theme for 2022 was "my voice: our equal future". On the other hand, the International Day of Education was adopted by UNGA in 2018 and the theme for this year is "Changing Course, Transforming Education".

Multi-Sector Coordination for Emergency Response in India

Launch of Handbook on Multi-Sector Coordination for Emergency Response in India: On 13th October 2021, Sphere India in partnership with NIDM, launched the Handbooks on Multi-Sector Coordination for Emergency Preparedness for Response in six sectors - education, health, food and nutrition security, WASH, shelter, and protection to strengthen preparedness and unified emergency response.

Pilot Testing of Multi-Sector Coordination Handbook was also initiated in 6 states through training modules developed from the Handbooks. 6 Pilot Trainings were organized in the states shared below and 3 day trainings for 6 sectors are planned in Nagaland, Uttarakhand, Jammu and Kashmir, Bihar and Kerala in February and March 2022.




Goonj- Dignity Diaries: Goonj is a 23-year-old non-profit organization that undertakes relief and rehabilitation work, especially focusing on disaster mitigation, humanitarian aid and community development, across India with the lens of dignity. During the pandemic, we have channelised 18.4+ million Kgs. of ration and other essential items, 1.71+ million facemasks, 90,000+ Family Medicine Kits, and 39,000+ Healthcare Cover Kits across 28 States and Union Territories. From standing with missed-out communities, to creating grassroots networks for sustainable development by respecting local traditions, and wisdom. We adapt as we go while essentially making giving a more mindful process. Our flagship Dignity for Work initiative, uses cloth as a currency to encourage people to address these issues. World Vision India- Covid 19 Response: World Vision India is present in 118 districts through APs (Area Programs) impacting 2.6 million children and their families in over 6200 communities spread across 25 states and union territories. World Vision India has been responding to the pandemic since March 2020 across India, supporting the government in reaching out to the health care delivery systems and most marginalized and the vulnerable population. In the first wave, World Vision India had reached over 6.6 million people through the COVID-19 emergency response. During the 2nd wave, the overall goal was to reduce further transmission of covid-19, strengthen healthcare for treatment & mitigate the impact of the outbreak in the long term and WVI was able to reach more than 3.2 million people. Pandemic Surge Support- COVID Report 2021: The second surge of COVID 19, with 41,61,676 cases on 24th April 2021 resulted into emergency situation in Maharashtra. COVID care facilities and hospitals ran short of beds, oxygen and essential medicines. On the social front families and communities were just restarted their livelihood activities after long and strict lockdown since March 2020 due to first COVID 19 surge.

On this background UNICEF Maharashtra Field Office (MFO) in collaboration with State Disaster Management Authority (SDMA), State Public Health Department and partnership with RedR India initiated surge deployments to provide technical support to local Government led coordination and other strategic interventions in the domain of communication, risk-governance, disease surveillance, rationalising the decisions of the lockdowns and restrictions, etc. [View Report>>](#)

Maharashtra Deluge Response Report: In the first week of August 2021, Maharashtra PECOnet, UNICEF Maharashtra, Sphere India, RedR India, and other developmental partners, and government line departments, conducted a JRNA in a sample of 946 households in 25 villages of 14 blocks across the 6 flood-affected districts of Maharashtra-Kolhapur, Ratnagiri, Raigad, Satara, Sangli and Sindhudurg. Based on the JRNA findings, CYDA and CACR, with UNICEF support, undertook a "Back to Home, Back to School" campaign to aid rehabilitation for close to 26,000 of the worst affected flood families with a core aim to provide relevant relief materials for the most affected communities.
